How to Use the Strong's Concordance



The Strong's Concordance is a powerful tool to enrich your Bible study and to unlock the mysteries of the Word of God. It is keyed to the King James Version of the Bible so you will need that version to use the Concordance.

The Concordance is divided into 3 parts:

- The Concordance itself which lists in alphabetical order every word that is contained in the Bible
- The Hebrew dictionary which lists the original Hebrew words in the Old Testament
- The Greek dictionary which lists the original Greek words in the New Testament

YOU DO NOT NEED TO KNOW HEBREW OR GREEK TO USE THE STRONG'S CONCORDANCE!

Example #1

Let's say you want to find out the definition of the word "angel". Below are two scriptures, the first from the Old Testament and the second from the New Testament, containing the word "angel":

The angel of the LORD encampeth round about them that fear him, and delivereth them. Psalm 34:7

And my temptation which was in my flesh ye despised not, nor rejected; but received me as an angel of God, even as Christ Jesus. Galatians 4:14

When we look up the word "angel" in the Strong Concordance section (see page 3), you will see the scripture context of each location of the word listed in order, from Genesis to Revelation. Next to the scripture is the book, chapter and verse where that scripture is located. The final section contains a number that is the key to finding the Hebrew or Greek word that is used in that particular scripture using the Hebrew and Greek dictionaries at the back of the Concordance. If you look closely, you will see that the numbers for the Old Testament scriptures are in regular type face but the numbers for the New Testament scriptures are in italics (like *this*).

Let's start with the Old Testament verse cited above. Once you find it in the Concordance section you will see that it shows the number 4397. This tells you where to find that word in the Hebrew dictionary. The Hebrew dictionary is at the back of the Strong's before the Greek dictionary. Both dictionaries are arranged in numerical order. All you need to do is find number 4397 in the Hebrew dictionary.

As you can see from page 4, the section for 4397 contains the Hebrew spelling of the word, the pronunciation and the definition. At the end of the definition there is a colon and a dash (:-) followed by a list of all the words that this Hebrew word has been translated as in the Bible.

Looking at page 5, the section for 32 in the Greek dictionary gives information regarding the origin of the word and refers you to 71 and 34 as related Greek words. The part after the colon and dash (:-) tells you that this Greek word has been translated as angel and messenger in English.

If you want to go further in your word study, you can go back to the Concordance section, look up "messenger" and see the instances where the actual Greek word is our 32, aggelos. This means that the translators chose to use the English word messenger when they could have used the English word angel.

He saith unto him the third time, Simon, son of Jonas, lovest (5368) thou me? Peter was grieved because he said unto him the third time, Lovest (5368) thou me? And he said unto him, Lord, thou knowest all things; thou knowest that I love (5368) thee. Jesus saith unto him, Feed my sheep. John 21:15-17

In this word study we see how the original Greek words that are translated as love (or lovest) have different meanings. Notice that Jesus uses 25 or agapao but Peter uses 5368 or phileo. In verse 17 Jesus begins using the same word Peter had been using. Jesus was graciously meeting Peter where he was in his understanding and capacity to love.

Other Uses

To locate a scripture

For all those times when you know a scripture but are not sure where it is located in the Bible, just pick out an important word in the scripture passage then look that word up in the Concordance section. You will see every instance where that word appears in the Bible.

To study a topic

For example, if you want to understand what God has to say about righteousness, just go to that word in the Concordance section and you can read every passage in scripture that deals with that topic.

To detect patterns

- Which Gospel writer uses the word "light" most often? (John)
- Which Gospel writer uses the word "kingdom" most often? (Matthew)
- Which Gospel writer uses the word "Jerusalem" most often? (Luke)
- Which Gospel writer uses the word "Jews" most often? (John)

As we can see from this guide, the Strong's Concordance is a great tool in uncovering revelation truth and providing insights into the depths of the Word of God that we would miss if we just read the English translation.
